iPhone 4

The iPhone 4 is a touchscreen Smartphone developed by *Apple Inc*. The most noticeable difference between the iPhone 4 and its predecessors is the new design, which incorporates an insulated stainless steel frame that acts as the device's antenna. It is probably the most expensive phone in the market right now.

The bands between the front and back are gone and have been replaced with flattened surfaces. The iPhone 4 is structured around a stainless steel frame that wraps around the edge of the phone. The left section of the band serves as the Bluetooth, Wi-Fi, and GPS antenna, and the right and lower sections of the band act as the antenna for GSM and UMTS connectivity.



The internal components are situated between two panels of aluminosilicate glass, described by *Apple* as being "chemically strengthened to be 20 times stiffer and 30 times harder than plastic".

The iPhone 4 allows audio conferencing, call holding, call merging, caller ID, and integration with other cellular network features.

Samsung Galaxy S2

Samsung Galaxy S2 is probably the best mobile phone that Samsung has launched. It is a Smartphone running under the Android operating system. For the Galaxy S II, the standard micro USB port found on the bottom of the device can be used with an MHL connector for an HDMI connection to an external display such as a high definition television.

The Samsung Galaxy S2 has the S5PC110 processor. This processor is capable of up to 20 million triangles per second.

It was chosen *Best European Smartphone of the Year*. It is a tactile mobile phone, with the exceptions of three buttons that can be used either to go back to where you were before or the other one to go straight to the main menu. You also have a button to use when you are already in an application .It is considered by many people to be the most sophisticated mobile phone that actually exists.



The Samsung Galaxy S2 comes with an option to connect to Wi-Fi networks through *private virtual*, which use special security protocols to access private services. This access is only for authorized persons.

Blackberry Curve 9300

The BlackBerry Curve is certainly one of the easiest to set-up email on. You should have your email up in running in minutes.

One of the biggest changes on the Curve is the replacement of the usual trackball with a track pad. Its sensitivity can be adjusted. The slight slant on the keys helps to ensure more accurate typing, which makes it easier to get used to. It is equipped with a 2 megapixels rear-camera with the maximum resolution of 1600x1200 pixels.

The phone also boasts 256 MB of RAM, 256 MB of ROM and expandable memory of micro SD card up to 32 GB. The value-added features of BlackBerry Curve 9300 are the push mail service, personal e-mail with up to ten accounts and BB Messenger. It's a great Smartphone if you compare its price with all the features it has.



For local connectivity, the device provides the Bluetooth 2.1 version and micro USB 2.0 port, and for wireless connectivity, it has lots of different versions that it can use.

HTC Sensation

The HTC Sensation includes an immersive HTC Sense experience making this phone easy-to-use and also a top entertainer. The premium design, complete with contoured glass edging, feels great in your hand. It is a multimedia *super phone*.

Surf the web in style with multi-window browsing, a quick lookup tool for jumping to Wikipedia or YouTube. With the instant capture camera, the moment you press the button is the same moment the photo is captured.

The lock screen has been transformed into a window to the magic on your phone. When checking the weather you can feel the sun's rays or wipe away the droplets of water.



It has a huge range of connectivity onboard, from Wi-Fi, to Bluetooth 3.0. Bluetooth connection strength and speed was very good throughout our review time, with wireless headphones showing no problems and the range was impressive too, with around 10 metres being the maximum distance (with walls in the way).





Carlos – Oh I'm sorry...


Mr Watts – but that happens, that's life, it happens. I imagine all your grandparents are still alive aren't they?






UP LEVANTE ON THE BATTLESIELD
