

The Business of Football

Recently, money is becoming an increasingly important part of football. However, this could destroy the essence of the most popular sport in the world.

14 of the 15 most expensive signings in the history of football have taken place in the last 6 years, with 8 of them costing over 80 million euros. This is just one of the many facts that reveal the huge influx of money in football. Some of the wealthiest businessmen in the world have seen football as a way of earning money, and this is having a huge impact on the game.



This year, Real Madrid and Barcelona receive 140-160 million euros from TV rights. On the other hand, teams such as Sporting, Eibar or Las Palmas earn only 15-20 million euros. This difference in earnings has decreased the competitiveness in the league, with minor teams having little chances of getting any points against the giants. For example, Real Madrid managed to score 10 goals to Rayo Vallecano, something that didn't happen since 1960.

While some teams can spend hundreds of millions in signings, others are affected by the crisis and fight to avoid disappearing. For example, in 2014, Elche was relegated despite finishing in 13th position due to the institution's debts with the State Tax Administration Agency. Even Sporting, who were promoted to La Liga

in 2015, have a debt of around 30 million euros and La Liga made it difficult for them to sign any players.

On the other hand, in other leagues such as the Premier League, the distribution of the money from TV rights is more balanced (all clubs received between 76 and 119 million euros in the 2013-2014 season): This has led to many unexpected results and has allowed Leicester, a relatively poor team which almost got relegated last year, to be top of the league and 20 points above Chelsea, the current title holders.



At this rate, La Liga will become unbalanced and very boring to watch compared to the Premier League, for example. This could end up affecting the big teams in the European competitions. So let's hope something changes or else the future of

<u>Life after ESA</u> (Editor: is there really?)

I and 8 other students from the latest batch of ESA graduates moved to the UK to attend British Universities. One more from our cohort will be joining soon. All of us go to different universities: London, Manchester, Southampton, Newcastle and many more. For the most part we all do different courses as well, from dentistry and medicine to economics and various types of engineering. Our experiences so far all differ slightly but there are more general things like life at university in the UK in general that are the same for us all; and these are the experiences I will attempt to describe.

Differences

First off, there are basic things in day to day life that are just different from Spain. Things tend to happen earlier in the UK. Things like eating times in particular are earlier in the UK compared to Spain, with a normal time for lunch being around 12-1pm. One thing you'll notice is the fact that most shops are open 7 days a week and won't be shut on a Sunday, so you can do your shopping when ever you like really. Something that really sticks out, particularly in the winter, is how early it gets dark. It will get dark between 4 and 5, so you could go into an afternoon class and come out at 4.30 and it be dark. A few

have pointed out that this is a bit depressing and it certainly takes some getting used to.

Is it for me?

Studying in the UK is definitely something everyone at the school should give some thought to. You are in the unique position of being able to speak the language and being used to an English style of learning. It may not be for everyone but there are many positives and enriching experiences to be had to by spending a period of your life living and studying in the UK.

Living at university in the UK is slightly different to Spain. During the first year at university everyone lives in university halls of residency. Everyone gets their own room usually and this can either have a shared bathroom or an en-suite, depending on the halls of residence you're at. The food varies depending on your halls, which are either catered on

non-catered; meaning you either get your food made for you or you have to make your own food. Some halls are better or newer than others; some will have more facilities such as sport pitches or a gym for example. If you end up going to university in the UK then remember to apply for accommodation as soon as possible to give you the best chance of getting the one you want. After the first year, people generally find a house to live in and share with a group of friends or people they have met during that 1st year.

The food itself is also different. There is no fabada or cachapo here! English food is really a bit of everything and you might enjoy it or might not; again its something you may have to get used to.

People from all over the world go to study in the UK. You'll find all types of people from every continent, so you should't worry about fitting in or finding people to make friends with; every first year is in the same situation at the very start.
